Manchester Evening News - Monday 30 November

St George's Singers of Poynton staked a weighty claim as the most enterprising choral society in the north west with last night's Elijah at the Bridgewater Hall.

A starry line up of soloists joined them under Stephen Williams' direction. Sir Willard White, in the title role, gave it that declamatory passion which is his trademark and fits the role of the righteous prophet ideally. Mark Padmore, tenor, is if anything more sought after, for his peerless diction and purity of tone, in sacred music.

Mary Plazas, soprano, and Sara Fulgoni, contralto, brought their classy operatic skills - the latter relishing her episode as Jezebel even a little more than angelic purity. But it was the superbly drilled massed voices of the chorus which made the performance. Manchester Camerata provided (with limited string numbers) an acceptable accompaniment, not always quite in sync with the voices, and Darius Battiwalla's rendering of the organ part made a rich and, on occasion, stunning contribution.

<u> REVIEW - Donald Judge</u>

Macclesfield 2, Bollington 1, Prestbury 1, Poynton 1... No, not football scores, but how many oratorio choirs are flourishing in parts of that alleged cultural backwater, The Borough of Macclesfield. All featured in concerts during November and December, the most ambitious of which was St George's Singers' performance of Mendelssohn's Elijah at Manchester's prestigious Bridgewater Hall on Sunday November 29th.

Elijah is a favourite of choirs and audiences alike, and no doubt this helped them fill the house, as did the presence of Sir Willard White. A compelling Elijah, his rich bass voice was complemented by the lighter tone and superb diction of tenor Mark Padmore. Mary Plazas and Sara Fulgoni completed an outstanding quartet, while young Robert Williams, resplendent in Manchester Cathedral Choir robes - perfect apparel for climbing mountains and watching for rain - sang The Youth with great accuracy and assurance.

Manchester Camerata, led by Richard Howarth, played with vigour and sensitivity, enhanced by some exquisite woodwind solos and thrilling and perfectly judged support from Daniel Battiwalla on the organ.

Stephen Williams conducted the performance with a mixture of dramatic drive and sensitivity to solo singers' penchant for rubato. There were numbers, mainly in part one, where one could have wished for brisker speeds (or the maintenance of the opening tempo), but overall, this was a splendid and convincing rendition.

The St George's Singers' fan club had turned out in force: thus, it was the Choir itself that received the greatest applause. Deservedly so, as tuning, attack, diction, balance, and tone were virtually flawless. This was most noticeable in a capella or lightly accompanied numbers. The semi chorus in Lift thine eyes was outstanding, and the same singers completely transformed their tone in Glory to God: with eyes closed, they could have been the boy trebles and altos of a cathedral choir.

From the opening Help, Lord (all the more powerful for being sung from memory) to the majestic closing Amens, this was a triumph for the Poynton Choir.

It was an inspiring evening and couldn't have been better...... I know how much blood, sweat, tears and terror of disaster these events involve and take my hat off to Geoff and the committee.


